Wasting Nothing

Last month, I was blessed to enjoy a week of vacation skiing with my children, father, and sister's family. At the beginning of the week, as has been our habit for decades, we sorted the recyclables from the rest of our trash. But then we discovered that there is no recycling in the area where we were staying. Nothing could be easily recycled.

In this Easter season, we celebrate the power of God's love that raised Jesus from death to life and can and does lift us from death to the fullness of life in God's loving presence. Nothing can get in the way of God's love, not even feeling that we are trash or others telling us we are disposable. As the saying goes, "God does not make junk!"

Our loving God who raises us to life is also our God who creates and sustains life on this beautiful earth. In God's ecology, in God's economy, nothing is wasted. Did you know that the Greek word *oikos* from which we get the words economy and ecology, means "household"? In God's household nothing is wasted. Everything is reused. What dies becomes a source of life for others. The grassy meadows and restful waters might give way to dark valleys, but those become tables set before us.

In this Easter season that is also Earth Month, we take notice of all that we throw out, all that we regard as trash. Did you know that the average American throws out three times as much trash today than in 1960? Much of the increased volume of trash is plastic. Creation Justice Ministries of the National Council of Churches notes:

"Everywhere we look in our culture you will find plastic. It surrounds our

food, it makes up our technology, and is a standard element in our household items. Unfortunately, it is also overflowing from our landfills, floating in our waters, and polluting our soil. More and more, you can even find it in our own bodies and those of other living creatures. There have even been traces of plastic found in breast milk. Despite the fact that we have learned the harms of plastics, we are steadily increasing our production of the material and integrating it into more and more items. Plastic is everywhere!"

This Easter season and Earth Month we'll be talking about and working together to reduce our use of (singleuse) plastics, recycle plastic and other materials, and advocate for less waste in God's household, so one day we might say with the psalmist:

The Lord is my shepherd. I lack nothing because God wastes nothing God lets me rest in grassy meadows free of litter; God leads me to restful, clean, and unsullied waters; God keeps me, a creature connected with countless of God's creatures, alive. God guides me in life-giving paths for the sake of his good name.

Faith Discussions: The Difficult Words of Jesus

During our Faith Discussion times on *Sundays* at 9:00 am from April 7 to May 12 we will examine the most perplexing teachings of Jesus with Dr. Amy-Jill Levine in this video Bible study experience.

Jesus provided his disciples teachings for how to follow Torah, God's word; he told them parables to help them discern questions of ethics and of human nature; he offered them beatitudes for comfort and encouragement. But sometimes Jesus spoke words that followers then and now have found difficult. He instructs disciples to hate members of their own families (Luke 14:26), to act as if they were slaves (Matthew 20:27), and to sell their belongings and give to the poor (Luke 18:22). He restricts his mission (Matthew 10:6); he speaks of damnation (Matthew 8:12); he calls Jews the devil's children (John 8:44).

In The Difficult Words of Jesus, Amy-Jill Levine shows how these difficult teachings would have sounded to the people who first heard them, how have they been understood over time, and how we might interpret them in the context of the Gospel of love and reconciliation.

Then God said, 'Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth.' (Genesis 1:26)

We are called to protect people and the planet, living our faith in relationship with all of God's creation. We show our respect for God by our stewardship of creation. Caring for the earth is not just an Earth Day slogan, it is a requirement of our faith.

In recognition of Earth Day April 22, 2024, St. Paul's Stewardship & Mission Team is asking each of us to take time to consider where, how, and why we recycle, both as individuals and as a church. Throughout the month of April, a temporary recycling station will be available in classroom #7 (next to the pastor's office). There will be handouts on recycling opportunities in our community, as well as collection bins/boxes for your use.

You are encouraged to bring recyclables which are currently not collected by the refuse services in our area, such as: magazines, paper (office, junk mail, phone books, etc.), books (paperback or hard cover), paperboard (cereal boxes, paper towel rolls, etc.), batteries (rechargeable, lithium ion, coin/button style, mercuric oxide), small electronics (cellphones, tablets, coffee makers, BP monitors, etc.), plastics (#1-7, styrofoam, plastic bags)

- Please note, all items should be clean, free of food particles or grease.
- We would appreciate your flattening all cardboard and paperboard boxes.
- Alkaline batteries cannot be accepted. The York County Solid Waste Authority has advised us that single-use batteries such as AAA, AA, 9V, C, or D cell do not contain mercury (since 1996) so when they are done, you can throw them in the trash.

Sometime ago I asked longtime friend Austin Chinault to write a short article in my place. Thank you Austin for sharing some memories of those days with us. *Chip*

Memories of moving into the new church facility:

I have been asked to reflect on moving into the new church facility and first worship service in the new sanctuary of St. Paul UCC, Stoverstown. After 40 years the date sticks in my mind, April 15, 1984! It was Palm Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week and all the mystery that Christ's death and resurrection implies—the heart and soul of our faith. It all seemed so fitting to find our new beginning here after all the work, exhaustion, obstacles, joys and exhilaration we had experienced during the last number of years. There were countless meetings, planning, encouraging, voting and praying to dissolve the Union Church and create a vision to build a new facility in the way that Christ was leading. On the whole it was a very positive experience to which many people were devoted. There was



a deep sense of completion in preparing that first worship service in the new building. I remember thinking that if my time had come I would be happy to lay down and die! Such was my sense of fulfillment in all that God had done for us, and with us, during the last number of years. We had come a long way in a short period of time and we gave God all the glory and credit because we walked by faith, realizing none of this could have been accomplished on our own.

We were blessed by our Conference leadership, by cooperation from the Lutheran Synod and our sister Lutheran congregation whom we loved. We received tremendous commitment from the lay leadership of our congregation, family members and many local businesses that worked with us to make the construction process easier. Perhaps 75% of the construction was accomplished by members of the congregation—some with very little experience, including shingling the new roof! Looking back it seems like a miracle!

I think we began that first service by gathering outside with everyone receiving a palm branch. We processed into the sanctuary waving our palms and singing "Hosanna" just like in the Bible. I don't remember any details of the service except such a feeling of happiness and joy that everyone had to be there. I don't remember the attendance, but some of those first services through the dedication on June 10, 1984, were very well attended reaching perhaps 200 people. We had a large youth group and a complete Sunday School and committee structure under the leadership of our new Parish Assistant, Phyllis Baum. It was a very rich time to be serving in Stoverstown. Perhaps worth remembering how far we had come in a five-year period as the whole church today, in all denominations, deals with the challenges of the ebb and flow of faith throughout history.

As the Bible says we are always dying and rising in Christ as we journey through this earthly life to the eternal kingdom.

Dear Friends,

April is often a month of contrasts. We can experience both winter and summer weather. We've just experienced the victory of Easter. April is also observed as Cancer Control Month. Cancer continues to be the second leading cause of death in our country.

You may wonder what you can do to reduce your risk of cancer. The following suggestions are taken from The American Cancer Society's brochure "Taking control".

Activities to protect you from cancer:

- Eat more cabbage family vegetables.
- Add more high-fiber foods to your diet.
- Choose foods with Vitamin A.
- Choose foods with vitamin C.
- Control your weight.

Activities to reduce your cancer risk:

- Trim fat from your diet.
- Avoid salt-cured, smoked and nitrate–cured foods.
- Stop smoking.
- If you drink alcohol, do so in moderation.
- Respect the sun's rays.





There are several things we can do to reduce our cancer risk. We can reduce our risk for cancer of the breast, colon, prostrate, esophagus and stomach by eating a diet that avoids fatty and cured meats. Smoking remains the biggest cancer risk factor. Smokers who quit will reduce their cancer risk. Heavy alcohol use has been associated with cancer of the liver. Too much time in the sun especially between 11am and 3pm causes skin cancer. You can protect yourself from the sun by using sunscreen with a factor of at least 30.

Have a good month and enjoy all the spring flowers, birds and even the April showers.

Images and Pictures – Part 1

This topic is one that catches many groups – you can't just use random pictures off of the Internet. It is illegal. Pulling pictures from Google or Pinterest and using them in your PowerPoints, flyers, website, or bulletins is, technically, not legal. There are some ways to check to see if the image you have found is legal and allowed to be used. Sometimes you have to give attribution (i.e. – name, location, website) to use it. It doesn't matter if you are non-profit – you are breaking copyright law.

Churches now have an Internet presence. In the past, you have gotten away with using someone's work without giving them credit (or paying for it) because the newsletter/handout/PowerPoint never went beyond the walls of your church. Now you are posting your newsletter to your website, you are advertising your activities on your main page, and you are posting your service – which includes the PowerPoint images you used. Points to remember:

- Anything that you create is copyrighted as soon as you create it. If you post a picture or write an article, it is copyrighted once it is completed.
- You must be given permission to use articles or images that were created by someone else.
- Fair use allows very limited use of someone else's work. (See https://bit.ly/3UMfv1v or search for Fair Use.) Just because you are a non-profit, doesn't mean that Fair Use applies.

When I ask people where they got the image, they often answer, Google images or Pinterest. This is similar to using a quote and saying that it came from a book from the library.

What you need to use are non-copyrighted images. The images can be in the Public Domain because the creator has chosen to make them available. There are also images that have a Creative Common's license (there are several versions of the CC license.)

In the May newsletter, we will share some sources of images that are FREE to use. Stay tuned...
