But to us who are personally called by God himself—both Jews and Greeks—Christ is God's ultimate miracle and wisdom all wrapped up in one. Human wisdom is so cheap, so impotent, next to the seeming absurdity of God. Human strength can't begin to compete with God's "weakness." – 1 Corinthians 1:23-25 (The Message)

It is said of March that "it comes in like a lion, and goes out like a lamb." Lions are remembered for their power and lambs their vulnerability. Fierce and cold lion-like weather is supposed to begin the month, while lamb-like mild weather ends it. In my experience, though, March's fierce and mild weather is more jumbled.

In the church calendar, this March begins in early Lent and ends on Easter Sunday. We journey with Jesus who fiercely proclaims in Mark's Gospel that "he must undergo great suffering, and be rejected..., and be killed, and after three days rise again." While Mark's Gospel has been long associated with the Lion, we seldom think of a fierce and powerful lion giving up his or her life. Sacrifice is what mild and vulnerable lambs do.

We have many strengths as a congregation, including our culture of caring, service and generosity, our humble and irenic spirit, our music ministry, and our attractive and accessible facility.

While we are blessed with these and other strengths, we are also aware of our vulnerability as a smaller congregation in a rapidly changing world.

Unlike Jesus, we don't readily choose to be or feel vulnerable. Taking the risk of being hurt does not come naturally. None of us wants to fail or be ashamed. But Easter assures us that God enters our vulnerability, our failures, our figurative deaths, and raises us to new life.

So we can keep trying and failing to share the good news of God's love, and God will lift us up. We can feel uncertainly about the new thing we are trying, and God will not stop loving us. We can go outside our comfort zones, and God will go with us. We can cringe at the missteps we take, the awkward things we say or do, and God will remain close. We can feel weak and vulnerable, but God's love abides.

Who knows? Our vulnerable moments, our failures, might be times when others grasp the power of faith.

Throughout his ministry to his final days on the road to the cross, we find stories of his relationships with ordinary, flawed, and unexpected people. He met, dined, and traveled with people who were not perfect. Many of them were struggling, some were outsiders or even outlaws. Whoever they were, from those he healed to the outlaws with him at his crucifixion, Jesus brought the good news of God's kingdom to those who most needed to hear it.

In *Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws*, pastor and bestselling author Adam Hamilton explores the life, teachings, death, and resurrection of Jesus as told in the Gospel of Luke. Through Luke's stories we find Jesus' care and compassion for all as he welcomes sinners and outcasts. As we study Luke and see Jesus' concern for those who were considered unimportant, we hear a hopeful and inspiring word for our lives today. *Beginning on February 25, we will be engaging in this study.*

7 Be patient, then, brothers and sisters, until the Lord's coming. See how the farmer waits for the land to yield its valuable crop, patiently waiting for the autumn and spring rains.

We have recently celebrated Christmas and the season preceding, Advent, where we all were preparing for the birth of Jesus. Sometimes we heard the word "patient" or "patiently" to emphasize how we were to wait. So it was 40 years ago as we were nearing the completion of the building. Lots of little things (big in terms of the scale of the church) but time-consuming as most of these tasks required much more skill and patience to complete correctly.



In this picture, to the left, we see Tim Stein and Bill Harrold at work on a bright sunny day judging from the light streaming in the doorway at the end of the Sunday School wing. You may be able to pick out the work in progress on the ceiling grid and the rough openings in each of the doorways. The electrician would soon be placing the light fixtures and wiring them so there would be no need for the "work lights" anymore. There appears to be some finish lumber already in place on the larger openings but is still needed in the smaller doorways.

This next picture, to the right, gives a good view of the Chancel Area as it rises up from the concrete floor of the Sanctuary. There were many details to plan out as all the finished woodwork to come later, around the piano pit, the organ pit, the organ itself, as well as the choir lofts, relied on the accuracy of the design and construction of the various levels of this area.



It was a very special Saturday, with snow still on the ground, as we welcomed the Kinsley crane to lift the steeple into place. Care was taken to secure the steeple to the cabling so that it would rise in a mostly vertical manner to have it descend onto the four larger bolts that had been put into place sometime earlier. Up, up, and away it rose up and then started lowering into place as the crew on the roof waited for the time to enter the hatchway and guide the steeple over and onto the mounting bolts. With a bit of persuasion the steeple nestled into place and then the various washers and nuts were put in place and tightened securely.

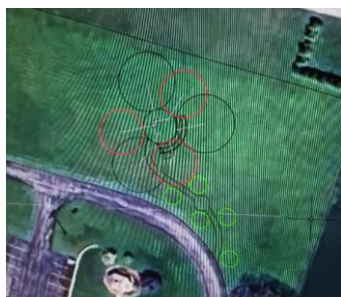

Dear Friends,
The entire month of March is in Lent this year.



Lent is a time when people give up something for Lent, more time for reflection or add something to your life. How would our community look if we each made a choice to do some special for someone every day during Lent?

March is named for the Roman god of war. We think of it as the beginning of spring, as March brings vernal equinox, the Full Worm Moon, and the return of daylight-saving time.

Here are some other special days and their origin that occur in March.

- March 8 is International Women’s Day which is a day that not only celebrates the achievement of women and the progress made toward women’s rights but also brings attention to ongoing struggles for equality around the world.
- March 10 marks the start of Ramadan, which begins at sundown. In Islam, Ramadan is considered a holy month when a month-long sunrise-to-sunset fast is observed.
- March 15 is the Ides of March! Legend surrounds this ill-fated day. Beware the Ides of March!
- March 17 is St. Patrick’s Day. According to folklore, folks wear a shamrock on St. Patrick’s day because the saint used its three leaves to explain the Trinity.
- March 19 brings about the March equinox- also called the vernal or spring equinox in the Northern Hemisphere-marking the beginning of spring. In the Southern Hemisphere, this date marks the autumnal equinox and the beginning of fall. On this day, the Sun stands directly over Earth’s equator.
- March 24 is Palm Sunday or Passion Sunday.
- March 31 is Easter Sunday, the day we celebrate Jesus’ resurrection. May 5 is Orthodox Easter.

Google Workspace (Part 2)

This is a continuation of the discussion of Google Workspace. The first part is in the February Newsletter. Our association has a free Google Small Business Workspace account that we received from working with Tech Soup. We use it primarily for email accounts. I am hoping to use it for a York Association Directory next. Our church has been using our Google Workspace since COVID. We were able to run our consistory meetings using the free Google Meet instead of paying for Zoom.

There are several advantages to Google Docs: you can edit them from any device (phone, tablet, computer), you can share it so multiple people can edit the documents at the same time, and you can see past history of the editing (in case something was erased or changed that should be.) There is a storage area called Google Drive where you can create folders for your documents and share either the document or the entire drive (the people you share drives with must have a gmail account.)

Our church was motivated into learning Docs because of COVID. We shared a Google folder with everyone who had a Gmail account. Those who did not have a Gmail account, got rights via a link. Using the shared document, each person filled out the information on their committee report before the meeting (instead of sending it to the church secretary to compile.) During the meeting some of us would be adding to reports (questions, new data) and when the consistory secretary went to write the minutes, she had all the notes we had entered during the meeting (less – I thought I heard this...) For those of us who enter all the words for the songs to be shown on screens, we shared a drive so once a song was typed up, it did not need to be typed again.

We have a shared spreadsheet showing recurring costs – many tech costs are hidden in the product, and they certainly do not send invoices! Sometimes we share the document so anyone can edit it, and sometimes we share it view only if they don't need to edit it.

If there is a document that several people have to use over the year, sharing it online and updating it there has many benefits, especially if it changes frequently – this way there is one copy, and you aren't trying to decide which copy is the most recent.
