Seeking God's Nearness this Lent

A couple brought a new puppy home. They took the puppy to a trainer, who spent most of her time training the couple. One of their lessons was what they were to do when he, out of the enthusiasm of youth, found it impossible to obey. "Leash him to the closet door where he can still see you," she said. "And then just ignore him. When he settles down, release him, and rub his ears."

It worked like a charm. Every time they employed her method, the puppy was magically transformed into a model of obedience. At their next session, they said, "This is amazing! How on earth can it be this easy?"

"It's simple," said their trainer. "Your puppy not only feels anxious when there is distance between you, your puppy wants nothing more than to be near you. He will do anything to make that happen."

In the trainer's words was a theological insight: Just as nearness is a puppy's heart's delight, an ecstatic end in itself, the same can be said of God and all those who choose to gather in God's name.

In this time of rapid change and upheaval that overlaps and seems to overshadow Lent, many of us feel anxious. We desire more than anything safe harbor in the storm, the safe harbor of God's hope, peace, justice, and mercy, refuge in God's presence. So, this Lent rather than focus on our need for personal and collective repentance, for making a catalog of personal sins as a way of asking for forgiveness and leaving behind old behaviors and priorities, we'll reflect first on our desire for God's nearness and God's desire for our nearness.

The Psalmist give language for this mutual desire of nearness. The Psalmist calls on God for refuge and God promises rescue (Psalm 91:2,

15). The Psalmist calls on God as sanctuary and shelter (Psalm 27:4-5). The Psalmist longs and thirsts for God's presence (Psalm 63:1). The Psalmist seeks God's forgiveness believing that "faithful love surrounds the one who trusts the Lord" (Psalm 32:10).

Living near to God allows us to follow in the way of Jesus who resists temptation (Luke 4:1-13), be unfazed by Herod's threats to kill him and to pray for those who live in fear and violence (Luke 13:31-15), to trust in God's nurturing patience (Luke 13:6-9), and God's prodigal love for each and all of God's children, no matter how far they and we have wandered from God (Luke 15).

In seeking God's nearness this Lent, may we experience that God invites not only us but every child of God to draw near to God, and to one another, in hope, peace, justice, and mercy.

Into the Deep UCC Lenten Devotional

When [Jesus] had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets."

-- Luke 5:4 (NRSVUE)

MARY LUTI | We often speak of God enthroned on high, God above the skies, God on the mountaintop. We raise our eyes, we lift our hearts, our prayers ascend. But when you read the great stories of the Bible, you have to look down for God, too.

Abysses, valleys, caves and bedrock, gorges and graves: God's trajectory is downward. God inhabits the depths of life, love, loss, ecstasy, and pain. God dwells in the profundities of prayer, in sighs too deep for words.

God loves the deep. Moses discovered this with Pharaoh's army breathing down his neck, when God's love plunged down into the sea and parted it. A wall of water on the left, another on the right, and in between, bedrock. Down there, at the bottom of things, God rescued the Hebrew children.

God loves the deep. Jonah discovered this when he fled by ship from the task God had given him. A storm arose, and the sailors threw him overboard. Fathoms down, a fish swallowed him. In its belly, dark and deep, Jonah reconsidered. Spewed onto shore, he went where he'd been told and preached mercy to foes.

God loves the deep. God works in the deep. Down there, God gives life, possibility, new direction. It's where the reckoning is, the wonder, the courage, the life-sustaining bliss.

So it's not surprising that when Jesus calls disciples, his first instruction to them is to go deep. No more skimming the surface, hugging the shore, wading in shallows. And when they brave the deeper waters and let down their nets, what comes up is fat, flapping, gill-breathing awe—a vision, a way of life, a joy no circumstance can alter.

And when Jesus himself had gone as deep as deep can be, down into death; when in the grave God found him, the buried seed, and raised him green; the first thing he did was go to his own, who'd gone fishing again but had caught nothing, and tell them anew: "Lower you nets; go deeper still." They hauled up resurrection.

We've come to Lent now, the profound season of the downward God. In its fathomless depths, what encounter, what reckoning, what sustaining awe, what courageous life is waiting for you?

Go deep. Find out.

Daily *Into the Deep* devotional readings will be distributed via email, and printed devotional booklets available to those without email.

Shared Mid-week Meals and Lenten Worship: Reflecting on the Psalms

For the second year, seven churches in the Spring Grove area, Bethlehem UMC, St. Paul's Lutheran, St. Paul's UCC, St. Peter's Lischey's, Trinity Lutheran, Trinity Roth's UCC, and Zeigler's Lutheran will be hosting Soup Suppers and worship on mid-week during Lent. On Ash Wednesday, and each Wednesday thereafter through April 9, and on Maundy Thursday, one of these congregations will be hosting a soup-supper beginning at 6:00 pm. (Note that the first disciples did not eat on Good Friday. A soup supper won't be served that day.) Sanctuary Renovation Update, February 2025

This committee was able to meet on February 8 to review the survey results. We are so grateful for your input that can further guide us. Some of the items, like painting, replacing carpet and pew spacing are widely acceptable and the comments you shared are helping us to plan the specific layout in conjunction with the New Holland Church Furniture Company. We will be able to increase space in the front of the sanctuary, have handicapped accessible seating and have a center space. We hope to finalize carpet selection and consider a broader selections of paint colors with the interior decorator at our next meeting,



The survey results for sound were also mostly positive. We considered 2 options for bringing the AV station into the sanctuary at this last meeting. Our goal with that is to be able to respond immediately to AV needs while maintaining symmetry in the layout of the sanctuary. The volunteers who operate the equipment are also worshippers, so we were keeping that in mind when we prioritized these options. The dimensions of the AV station should also be reflected in the future layout from New Holland.

The visual projections suggestions were also strongly agreed to and it was a high or medium priority for a majority of people. The logistics of this have been challenging for us to consider, because, like many of you commented, we know how important being able to focus on the cross is. While we hope that the sanctuary design allows for us to focus our attention on worship, we know that at times we may be looking at a bulletin, hymnal or at the monitor or screen off to the side as we participate in the service. At other times, however, like when we are reflecting on a message, preparing for communion, listening to music or at a time of prayer, we can center ourselves on what it means to follow a risen Christ. Some of the suggestions that were shared in the survey are things we have set up visually in the sanctuary using a portable screen and projector. As with the changes to pew spacing, we anticipate that whatever way we ultimately decide to project, each person and family will find it is still comfortable and welcoming.

The choir loft renovations were not ranked as high of a priority as the other projects, but most people are agreeable to it. The committee has not discussed the specifics of this other than what was described in the survey, however the suggestions offered about space for music, the type of seats and seeing the director will be important considerations for us. Other considerations are the safety and accessibility for our choir members.

Nurse's Notes



Dear Friends,

We are approaching the Lenten season. Lent is 49 weekdays from Ash Wednesday to Easter. It ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It is a time for reflection and fasting. This year I challenge you to try to do one good deed each day. It could be anything from something small to something big.

On the health side I am going to talk about Tuberculosis. World TB Day is on March 24. This annual event commemorates the date in 1882 when Dr. Robert Koch announced his discovery of Mycobacterium tuberculosis, the bacillus that causes tuberculosis.

TB is a contagious disease infection that usually attacks your lungs. It can also spread to other parts of your body, such as your brain or spine. It is a type of bacteria called mycobacterium tuberculosis bacillus.

The day is to raise public awareness and understanding about the world's deadliest infectious killer, TB and its health, social and economic impact on people around the world. In 2023 there were 9,633 reported cases in the U.S., which was the highest since 2013.



Even with treatment available, TB still claims 4 in every 100 people worldwide a day and close to 27,000 people fall ill with the preventable and curable disease. The emergence of drug-resistant TB poses a major health treat that could put the gains made to end the global TB epidemic.

TB is primarily spread through the air when a person with active TB disease coughs, sneezes, speaks or sings. The bacteria are released into the air as tiny droplets that can be inhaled by others. Anyone near the sick person with TB

disease can breathe the tuberculosis germs into their lungs. People with active TB disease are most contagious during the early stages of the illness, when they may not have obvious symptoms.

On a lighter note, we should soon be seeing signs of spring crocus, pussy willows, and daffodils.
