The Indiscriminate Giver

Do you respond to gifts or invitations with a sense of obligation? That is something I remember about my mother. If a friend or neighbor gave her a gift, she felt obligated to write a thank you note. If friend or neighbor invited her to a dinner or a party, she felt she had to invite them to a dinner or party. This is what gratitude demanded. For her giving and receiving were transactions in the economy of gratitude; giving was the proper response to receiving, and receiving had to be reciprocated with gifts.

Is that how it is with God? An interesting verse in the book of James says that: "Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change" (James 1:17). It might seem from this verse that God hands out goodies to us personally, and wants thank you notes in return. But James writes that "every" gift and "every" act of giving is a reflection of God's light shed on the whole world, a light that shines everywhere, all the time, accessible to all.

I hear in this verse an echo of Jesus' claim that the sun rises and the rain falls on the "righteous and unrighteous" (Matthew 5:45). Jesus often speaks of a wildly generous God, one who lavishes drunken wedding guests with even more and better wine, who throws seed around with abandon, who issues invitations to the unnamed poor to dine, who throws a party for a profligate son, who multiplies fish and bread so that thousands may eat their fill, with plenty leftover. To the crowd of peasants who follow him to a Galilean hillside, Jesus showers blessings: "Blessed are the poor! Blessed are those who hunger!" (Matthew 5:3, 6). "Presents for everyone who has a need!"

God's gifts are not obligations to be repaid; rather, they are gifts to be enjoyed. There are no expectations of exchange. No transaction involved. The author of James goes on to say that if you understand in your heart that gifts and gratitude are part of the very fabric of creation, you will be a better person and do good in the world (James 1:19-27). This is all-encompassing grace.

Such grace moves us toward mystery, awe, and wonder of the blessings of God, the Indiscriminate Giver. We indeed are all recipients of the prodigal gifts and amazing grace of our Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer. All we can do in response to such grace is invite others to enjoy it with us. Opening our hearts to the constant flow of receiving and responding that happens all around us all the time nurtures within us the desire to be generous as God is generous—to be a light to the world.

The Outreach Director at Bell said, "We are so appreciative of this wonderful donation and much of the underwear has been distributed already to the children and folks at the shelter."

In addition to our donations to the North Codorus Fire Company and the Spring Grove Weekend Backpack program back in July, we recently decided to use the remaining profits for Walmart and Target Gift Cards for families in need in the Spring Grove Area School District.

Hanover Against Hunger has raised \$160,000 and packed more than half a million meals in the last six events. Dear Friends,

November is National Child Safety and Prevention Month. Even if you don't have young children these tips are good to make your home safe for your grandchildren and great-grandchildren and other young children who may be visiting in your home.

KEEP CLEANING MATERIALS AND MEDICATION SAFELY OUT OF RANGE

Children try to use spray bottles and mistake medication for candy. To help ensure this doesn't occur, place plastic locks on all storage cabinets containing cleaning materials and other common household maintenance items. Ensure all medication is kept in childproof bottles stored out of reach of children.



SECURE YOUR BATHROOM

With its combination of hot water and wet floors, the bathroom is often a dangerous place for young children. To help minimize the risk for injury parents should turn the water heater temperature down, safely secure all razors and other medicine cabinet items and install slip-resistant mats and a toilet lock.

COVER ELECTRICAL OUTLETS

As they begin to navigate the world, children rely on their sense of touch to learn about new things. In the case of electrical outlets or frayed wires, this naturally inquisitive behavior can lead to life-threatening injuries. Be sure to cover all outlets with childproof covers and make sure the cords attached to appliances and other devices are in good condition. Teach your children to avoid touching these items and to never mix electricity with water.

MAKE SURE ALL SMOKE AND CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS ARE FUNCTIONING

Don't wait for the presence of fires or carbon monoxide leaks until it's too late. This means it's imperative to install detectors throughout the house and check batteries regularly. Don't wait for low battery signals to start beeping-check detectors on a regular basis to ensure they still work

FOLLOW THE SAFETY RULES GOVERNING USE OF A CAR SEAT

Car seats have been instrumental in saving the lives of countless children. Laws vary from state to state but in PA you are required to put the car seat on a rear seat, and facing backwards. Make sure the seat is installed correctly and that all belts are in place. It's also important to replace your child's car seat if you've been in a collision, as this may have damaged the seat.

NEVER LEAVE A CHILD IN A CAR

Even if you're only stepping out momentarily, never leave your children inside a warm vehicle. Kids cannot cool down with the same efficiency as adults, making them particularly susceptible to high temperatures. It's also important to always check your backseat to ensure your child hasn't been left behind. While this might sound obvious, busy parents sometimes forget.

Monthly Mission Offering: Bell Socialization

Bell Socialization Service, Inc. began in 1966 as "The Bell Club", a social gathering for people being discharged from local psychiatric hospitals into the greater York, PA community. Early Bell programs included meals and activities hosted by churches and organizations, as well as dances, presentations, and outings. Bell began to enrich mental health services and in 1977 programs were also added to assist individuals with intellectual disabilities. In 1986 the agency added shelter services to meet the needs of York County's homeless families. Bell Services continued to evolve and expand. Today about 2,500 people are served each year through dozens of programs offering housing and basic living supports, guided by Bell's Vision, Mission, & Values.

**Our journey begins with an informational meeting
on Sunday, November 9 at 11:30am. After that,**

gatherings will be held on Mondays – November 17, December 1, December 15, and December 29 at 6:00 pm – upstairs in the church parlor. Each one-hour meeting offers simple practices like deep breathing, meditation, and other self-care activities, along with conversation about everyday struggles, gratitude, and caring for mind, body, and spirit.

Special events are also part of our rhythm. This December, we will host a *Blue Christmas* service on Sunday, December 21 at 3:00pm, offering space for reflection and hope during a season that can sometimes feel especially difficult. Take-home resources will also be provided to help extend care beyond our time together.

New American Welcome Center UPDATE

At the New American Welcome Center, we are still standing firmly with and for our newest neighbors. This year has been a constantly shifting, often confusing one to date, but we continue to find ways to help and to accompany our clients in their experience of navigating life in their new community.

More than two hundred of our clients lost the right to work when their legally obtained Work Authorization cards were revoked and given an arbitrarily backdated end date of April 25th. In response, so many community members, volunteers, and churches stepped up in donating staple food items: rice, beans, oil, etc. along with an influx of constantly needed toiletry items like soap, toothpaste, and feminine products. Although we can often not do anything to change the immigration experience these people are living, we can express the understanding and concern of this community when we can give them a bag of necessary items when they come by the office. Thank you to all the churches in the York Association who have helped in this way! It has been and continues to be an encouragement and a breath of hope to many.
